Pleasant Childer Patriot Grave Marking Service.

A Patriot Grave Marking Service was held Saturday, November 23rd at the Pikeville Cemetery to honor Patriot Pleasant Childers. Pleasant Childers served as a soldier in the Revolutionary War in the 5th Regiment of the NC Continental Line and was in the battles of the Guilford Court House and Stone's Ferry. This service was conducted by Rev Forrest Childron who is past KYSSAR President, past President General of Central District consisting of the states of Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, and West Virginia.

Colonel Alfred Coleman, Descendant, talked about the patriot service record and his involvement in the Revolutionary War and listed some of the families of this area that are also his descendants. The Posting of Colors and Standards was under the direction of the Kentucky Society SAR Color Guard, with participation by the Governor Isaac Shelby SAR Chapter, the Lafayette SAR Chapter and the Big Sandy SAR Chapter.



Colonel Stephen Trigg Chapter

Trigg County Resident Locates Grave of His Patriot Ancestor

Dr. Dennis Adams of Trigg County recently began the process of making application to become a Compatriot in the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). The SAR is a lineage society that is open to men who can historically and documentarily prove their direct-line blood descent from a Revolutionary War patriot.

With a little genealogical help from his pastor and local Compatriot in the Col. Stephen Trigg Chapter, Geoff Baggett, he learned that he was descended from a particularly storied patriot. He discovered that he was the 4th great-grandson of William Addison, a private in the South Carolina Militia. Locating a copy of his pension records, Dr. Adams was treated to a wealth of information about this previously unknown ancestor.

William Addison was born on December 29, 1766, and enlisted in the militia as a substitute for his brother in 1780 at the tender age of 13. After a short period of service he was furloughed. Later in 1780 he re-enlisted in Fairfield County in a company of Rangers (Mounted Militia) commanded by a Captain John Gray. He served primarily in a local force that engaged and rounded up Tory soldiers until the unit received orders to join the army of General Nathanael Green shortly before the famous Battle of Eutaw Springs.

The unit joined General Pickens on the day before the battle and entered into the engagement. Addison was wounded in the chest by a spent ricochet round during the battle, but survived and recovered. He served in the active service for a total of three years, and was released at age sixteen. His service is confirmed by Brigadier General Francis Marion, the famous commander known as "The Swamp Fox," whose Pay Book L, entry 1, lists William Addison as being paid for service in the South Carolina Militia.

In 1788 he immigrated to Kentucky and settled in Madison County. After being in Kentucky only nine weeks, he was recruited to join the company of Captain Jacob Starnes in the war against the Northwestern Indians in Indiana and Ohio. He was mobilized for a total of nine weeks in that campaign. He later relocated to Todd County, Kentucky, where he was granted a pension for his Revolutionary War service on June 3, 1833, in the amount of \$80 annually. He died on May 20, 1853, and is buried in the Gant Cemetery in the Sharon Grove community of Todd County.

Last week Dr. Adams and Mr. Baggett located the cemetery and found the actual military grave marker of this illustrious Revolutionary War hero. It was a stirring moment as Dennis paused and contemplated his ancestor who battled to help give birth to the United States of America.

The Col. Stephen Trigg Chapter of the SAR is anxious to help other local men discover their Patriot ancestors and get them involved in the historical and educational mission of the SAR. 

Compatriot Presidents of the United States

The Sons of the American Revolution is proud of its compatriot Presidents of the United States. We honor these Compatriots who used their position as President to build a better America. Each remembered the founding of this great nation and the role of his Revolutionary War ancestor in making American the beacon of liberty and justice of all.

Three Presidents, George Washington, James Monroe, and Andrew Jackson actually served during the Revolutionary War.

Six Presidents were real sons of Revolutionary War Patriots. These included John Quincy Adams, Martin Van Buren, William Henry Harrison, John Tyler, IV; Zachary Taylor, and Franklin Pierce.

Five Presidents were grandsons of Revolutionary War Patriots. These included: James Knox Polk, Millard Fillmore, Abraham Lincoln, Chester A. Arthur, and Grover Cleveland.

President James A. Garfield was the great grandson of a Revolutionary War Patriot. President Richard M. Nixon was the great grandson of a Patriot.

There have been 16 Presidents of the United States who were also Compatriots. The Winter 2001 issue of The SAR Magazine featured the Presidents with details of their backgrounds, including information about their Revolutionary War ancestors. When President George W. Bush became President and a member of the Society the magazine carried a major news story that included a photo of him receiving his Membership Certificate.


