The NSSAR and KSAAR have a Surgeon General or Surgeon among the list of officers. The responsibilities of this office are similar: advise the organization of any health matters which may be of concern to the membership, offer advice on good health to the members, and be available during meetings if required by the members. According to the KSSAR constitution, "Each chapter shall have a President, Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, and such other officers as it may elect." At its meeting in December 2020, the Lafayette Chapter added a surgeon to its list of approved officers. Other chapters in the state may want to consider adding the position. Although the NSSAR requires the surgeon be a licensed physician of medicine or osteopathy, other health professionals (dentist, nurse, emergency medical technician, etc.) could serve in this position. The Lafayette Chapter constitutional amendment states: 'The Surgeon shall be a member of the Medical Profession licensed in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. He shall offer advice on good health to the members and be available during meetings if required by the members." The current health environment supports the need for such a position at the chapter level, and chapter surgeons could provide a pipeline for the office at the state and national levels.



"I have wanted to honor General Daniel Morgan for some time," Keetan said. "The people who settled here obtained to name this county for him.

"The SAR is an organization of the same than a morganization of me, who are district."

The SAR is an organization of men who are direct descendants of patrens who served and fought in the American Revolution. We seek to preserve the memory of our Revolutionary War heroes and the memory of our ancestors of the Revolution in it is part of our duty to keep that legacy alive."

Keeton then shared a history of General Morgan, who was born in New Jersey to Welsh immigrants in 1735 or 1736, and later settled in Winchoster, Va., to become an officer in the Virginia militua prior to the Revolutionary War.

of Saratoga, Cowpens and Keeton described General Morgan as a "great military tactician" noting that his actions in the Battle of Cowpens in which he beat the British forces led by Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton – put the Continental defeat British General Charles Comwallis in the siege at Yorktown, Va., in 1781.
Following the Revolutionary War, General Morgan was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1796, and served there until 1799.
General Morgan died on July 6, 1802, and was buried in Winchester, Va., at his estate known as "Soldier's Rest." When a new county was formed in Kentucky on Dec. 7, 1822, from portions of Floyd and Bath counties, settlers chose to name their station after General Morgan.
Keeton said that J. Blaine Nickell, father of late local historian Lynn Nickell, had noted in the past that the men who organized the county had served in the Revolutionary war with General Morgan.
Counties in several other states — including Alabama. Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee and Virgina – were also named in General Morgan County have something to be very proud of, Kecton said "General Daniel" Kec




# **Gov. Isaac Shelby Chapter Flags for Veterans Day**



Rebecca's own story, as imagined creatively by Sue Kelly Ballard, is so captivating, so gut-wrenchingly realistic, so obviously genuine, we begin to acknowledge who really moved America westward: our pioneer mother ancestors. Ballard captures every mood and moment of Rebecca's life in the backwoods and on the frontier with accuracy and passion, with authenticity and beauty, and at a pace that keeps the reader diving headlong into each new page eager to swallow up what happens next. Ballard's descriptions of the sights and sounds of the sylvan wilderness, of life's daily routine around a cabin set in a clearing made in the woods, and of the people and animals, both welcomed and unwelcomed, who come there are not segregated into long passages, but are tossed in generously as short snippets on top of the action, keeping the reader easily imagining the setting and circumstances as the story roars ahead. When a dozen things are happening at once, it takes a skilled frontier woman and a talented writer to keep everyone and everything moving along together.


